Unit 6: Mythical Creatures

Theme:

Create and explore mythical creatures through drawing, painting, and sculpting. Develop stories around these creatures while applying skills from previous units.

Lesson 1: Drawing Dragons

Objective:

Students will draw dragons, focusing on using shapes and textures to bring their mythical creatures to life.

Lesson Outline

Objective:

Draw dragons using a variety of shapes and textures.

Understand how to add detail and personality to mythical creatures.

Review/Do Now:

Question: "What natural patterns did you use in your rock painting?"

Allow students 3 minutes to write down their answers.

Hook:

Activity: Show various dragon illustrations and discuss their different features.

Ask students, "What makes each dragon unique, and what details can you see?"

8 Key Facts:

- Dragons are mythical creatures that appear in many cultures' folklore.
- Dragons can have a variety of shapes, sizes, and colors.
- Artists use shapes like circles, ovals, and triangles to build the structure of a dragon.
- Textures like scales or fur can add detail to dragon drawings.
- Dragons often have special features such as wings, horns, or claws.
- Adding personality to a dragon can make it more interesting and unique.
- Dragons are often depicted in art as both fierce and majestic.

• Drawing a dragon involves understanding proportions and perspective.

Word Bank:

Texture: The feel or appearance of a surface.

Proportion: The relationship between the size of different parts of a drawing.

Perspective: The technique used to represent three-dimensional objects on a two-dimensional surface.

Activity:

Name: Dragon Drawing

Lesson:

Discuss the various features of dragons and how they can be depicted in drawings.

Show examples of dragon illustrations and explain how different shapes and textures are used.

Comprehension Questions:

What shapes can you use to draw a dragon?

How can textures be added to make a dragon look more detailed?

Why is it important to consider proportion when drawing a dragon?

Exit Ticket:

"Describe one unique feature you added to your dragon drawing and why."

Activity: Dragon Drawing

Materials List:

- Drawing paper
- Pencils
- Erasers
- Colored pencils or markers
- Rulers (optional)

Step-by-Step Instructions:

Preparation:

Ensure each student has drawing paper, pencils, and erasers.

Distribute colored pencils or markers for later use.

Introduction (5 minutes):

Explain that students will be drawing their own dragons.

Show examples of dragon drawings and discuss their features.

Demonstration (5 minutes):

Demonstrate how to start with basic shapes (circles, ovals) to create the body structure of a dragon.

Show how to add details like wings, scales, and claws.
